Blue Jays Hold Off Bulldogs in Opener

Special teams made the difference Friday night as the Washington Blue Jays opened the season with a 26-21 home win over the St. Clair Bulldogs.

Of the eight scoring plays in the game, four came on special teams.

"Special teams was a huge part of our game tonight," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said.

"We got some great plays on the special teams tonight," St. Clair Head Coach Brian Robbins said. "We blocked a punt. We had some awful snaps tonight, too. We'll get those things fixed."

Overall, both coaches feel there's plenty of work to be done.

"It's a win," Schneider said. "We had many opportunities to put the game away and just could not do that, so it was disappointing. I am very proud of the fact that we were able to finish it even though we kept St. Clair in the game as long as we did. St. Clair did a heck of a job."

Robbins felt mistakes made the difference.

"The bottom line is that we made too many mistakes," Robbins said. "Just like I told the kids, it wasn't just one thing. We just made too many mistakes, bad snaps, putting the ball on the ground and penalties at crucial times."

Special Teams

"Special teams was a huge part of our game tonight," Schneider indicated.

The game's first score was on a 12-yard blocked punt return by St. Clair's Paul Armistead, the only special teams miscue for the Blue Jays. That gave St. Clair the lead. On the extra-point attempt, a low snap led to holder Adam Hinson scrambling to find Devon Thompson open in the end zone for the conversion.

The next big special teams play put the Blue Jays on top, 16-15, with 56 seconds left in the first half. Jay Jacquin tackled St. Clair punter Kyle Walters in the end zone for a safety. The ball had been snapped over Walters and he was able to gather it in before getting tackled.

"The safety almost ended with a touchdown," Schneider said. "Jay was diving after the loose ball on the turf."

Washington never trailed after that.

The next big special teams play was a 48-yard punt return by Seth Bollmann in the third quarter.

"It was a heck of a play and Seth did some good things to make people miss," Schneider said. "Any time Seth touches the ball, good things happen. He's a special player."

Bollmann averaged 20 yards per punt return in the game.

Freshman Conlan Jarvis kicked a 28-yard field goal later in the quarter.

Conlan Jarvis is great on kickoffs, he made his extra points and his field goal," Schneider said. "He's a true freshman. He's been in high school since Tuesday and he comes through."

Overall, Schneider was thrilled by the play of sophomore punter Trey Walsh.

"Trey was our MVP tonight, no doubt in my mind," Schneider said. "He put us into positions all night long to help our defense out. The one they scored on was not the only one he put inside the five-yard line tonight. By far, he was our MVP on the night."

Bulldogs' Biggest Play

St. Clair recorded a 99-yard touchdown run by quarterback Collin Scott with 7:34 to play which reduced Washington's lead to within a touchdown and made the final minutes anxious for both benches.

"We called that particular play two times earlier in the ballgame," Robbins said. "Why did we execute it then? Why didn't we execute that earlier. We should have had a run like that earlier in the ballgame."

"All of a sudden, we went from a very big lead, pinning them inside the one, to giving them a 99-yard touchdown and we've got a game for the last eight minutes," Schneider said. "I am very proud of the fact that we were able to finish it even though we kept St. Clair in the game as long as we did. St. Clair did a heck of a job."

Statistics

Washington's Isaac Lippert completed four of 10 pass attempts for 42 yards, one touchdown and one interception.

On the ground, he picked up 74 yards on 13 carries.

"I was so proud of Isaac Lippert," Schneider said. "I'm hard on all of our quarterbacks. He went out and finished this game. I'm just tickled to death for him. He didn't have a great game, but he finished it when we needed him to do that."

On the ground, the Blue Jays ran for 234 yards. Jared Rennick gained 117 yards on 10 carries, but Schneider feels he's capable of more.

“Jared Rennick is almost the spitting image of Kyle Summers, although Kyle had two years of varsity experience by this point in his career,” Schneider said. “Jared had a tremendous game. We’ve got to have him for 25-30 carries. He’s got to be a workhorse for us. This was his first varsity snaps tonight.”

Rennick did miss some time due to cramping issues and Brendan Reed picked up nine carries for 44 yards.

Through the air, Rennick caught two passes for five yards, Ben Straatmann caught a 22-yard touchdown pass and Bollmann had one catch for 15 yards.

Defensively, Jacob Brinker was the top tackler with 14 total stops. Jacquin ended with 12 and Nick Thiel had nine. St. Clair picked up 377 rushing yards in the game. Scott’s 99-yard run helped him lead the Bulldogs. For the game, he had 13 carries for 143 yards.

Evander Spinks topped the 100-yard mark as well with 107 yards on 10 carries.

Cody Bredall ran 11 times for 70 yards and a touchdown. Alex Miller picked up 39 yards on eight carries. Adam Hinson ran twice for 10 yards.

Scott was 1-8 for no yardage as a passer. Hinson completed a pass for a two-point conversion.

Defensively, Jagger Thompson led the Bulldogs with eight total tackles. Armistead added six stops while Charlie Fuchs added five solo stops.

Spinks had St. Clair’s interception.

“I’m excited about what we can become,” Robbins said. “I was proud of the way we fought tonight. We could have laid down early, but we didn’t. We’re inconsistent. We’re blocking the wrong people and not making the right decisions all of the time.”

Week 2 Previews

Both teams go on the road Friday night for 7 p.m. games.

The Blue Jays are at Sullivan while St. Clair goes to Ozark.

“We’ll get film on them,” Schneider said about the Eagles. “They’re very physical. We’ll see a very good team which has made runs into the playoffs over the past couple of years. They’ll want to beat the tar out of Washington Friday night.”

Special teams are a strength for the Eagles of Andy Arnette. Kicker Jake Lochner booted a 51-yard field goal in the loss last week and added a 43-yard field goal. Additionally, JJ Miller returned a kickoff 87 yards.

Troy Creek was the top running back, gaining 121 yards and two touchdowns on 15 carries. Defensively, Dane Hartman made 16 tackles with a fumble recovery.

Sullivan fell 34-27 at Park Hills Central last Friday.

St. Clair goes to Ozark, a team Robbins knows little about.

“I don’t know anything about Ozark other than they’re Class 5 and have about 1,500 kids in the high school,” Robbins said. “They were semifinalists two years ago. They run an unconventional offense because I know Coach (Mark) Bliss down there.”

The Tigers defeated Bolivar last week on the road, 27-25.

Sullivan Controls Blue Jays, 30-8

Controlling the ball, and the tempo, the Sullivan Eagles rolled past the Washington Blue Jays Friday night in their home opener, 30-8.

Both teams are 1-1 following the game.

Sullivan ran 59 offensive plays, picking up 544 yards and making sure the Washington defense got plenty of field time during the game.

"The kids came out, worked hard this week, and really deserved it," Sullivan Head Coach Andy Arnette said. "We made some adjustments at halftime and it proved to be the difference."

"It's about what we expected from Sullivan," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said. "We knew they were going to come out and run the ball. They wore us down. Our defense spent way too much time on the field."

Washington threw for 126 yards and ran for 61 yards in the game.

Sullivan showed what it's capable of doing on its first drive of the game, which absorbed a good portion of the first half. The Eagles drove 96 yards, putting the ball into the end zone on a Troy Creek 13-yard run with 10:36 left in the half.

"We didn't play our best defense on that first drive," Schneider said. "We played good enough to make them earn it. We learned from it and did better for the rest of the first half and into the third quarter."

Washington was able to hold Sullivan after that until the break. The Blue Jays clamped down defensively.

However, in the second half, that changed. Fatigue and short field situations for Sullivan due to turnovers or penalties allowed the Eagles to add to the advantage.

"You just can't play three of the four quarters on defense and expect good things to happen," Schneider said.

"They're going to get worn down and that's what happened. Sullivan did a good job of just pounding away."

Sullivan's Running Game

Creek was Sullivan's standout among its rotation of running backs. He ran 21 times for 141 yards and three touchdowns.

"That's his second game at running back for us," Arnette said. "Last week, he ran for 121 yards. He ran well tonight. I'm hoping he can keep doing that for us this year."

Dylan Harmon ran 12 times for 91 yards and Sullivan's final touchdown with 42 seconds left in the game.

Zach Holtz carried the ball seven times for 46 yards while quarterback Michael McDermott had nine carries for 19 yards. JJ Miller had five carries for 14 yards.

The Eagles even completed their first three passes of the season. McDermott was 3-5 for 27 yards, all to Brent Davis.

"We found something in the defense and tried to keep going on that," Arnette said. "It's getting there. It's getting better. We struggled throwing the ball early last year. We're just going to continue to improve."

Washington Touchdown

The Blue Jays broke the shutout in the fourth quarter when quarterback Isaac Lippert found Seth Bollmann for a completion. Bollmann broke a couple of tackles and went the rest of the way for a 45-yard touchdown.

"That was a great play," Schneider said. "We had a lot of stuff open tonight and we weren't delivering the ball very well. It's not just our quarterback position. Our running backs weren't running the ball well. We've got to get over it."

For the game, Bollmann caught four passes for 75 yards and one score. Lippert was 11-22 for 176 yards and one touchdown.

Austin Finder

Washington senior receiver and defensive back Austin Finder had to leave the game with a knee injury in the second quarter. He stayed until the game ended, trying to support his teammates.

"He's a great kid and a heck of a baseball player," Schneider said. "You hate to see something like that happen in the second game. He's a good kid and I'm sure good things will happen for him."

Schneider said with the injury, it's likely the Blue Jays will get younger.

"We're a growing team," Schneider said. "We're young, and with Austin going out, we're going to have another sophomore on the field. It's not so much about the opponent right now, but us learning how to be better football players on a daily basis."

Finder caught four passes for 38 yards while making one tackle defensively.

Washington Stats

The Blue Jays were led on the ground by Jared Rennick, who had 14 carries for 62 yards. Lippert was next with four runs for 12 yards. Brendan Reed, Seth Bollmann and Trey Walsh also had carries.

Tanner Webb caught one pass for eight yards and Ben Straatmann had one catch for six yards.

Jacob Brinker led the Blue Jays with 13 total tackles. Adam Kleekamp had 11 total tackles while Jay Jacquin had 10 total stops.

Week 3 Matchups

The Blue Jays come home to host Warrenton (2-0) Friday while Sullivan goes to Union (0-2) in what is expected to be a key Four Rivers Conference matchup.

"Our biggest thing is getting better ourselves right now," Schneider said. "The opponent will take care of itself."

Schneider knows the Warriors will be a big challenge for Washington.

"It's going to be nice to be at home again," Schneider said. "They're a well-coached team. Coach (Steve) McDowell does a great job and he'll have his kids ready to play."

Warrenton has defeated St. Dominic and Troy so far.

"Just about every year in my six years, we've played Warrenton nip and tuck," Schneider said. "I expect the same thing this year."

Even though Union is winless coming into Friday's game, Arnette isn't taking anything for granted.

"It's a big conference game next week at Union," Arnette said. "We're going to prepare to try and stop that high scoring Union offense."

Arnette knows Union will be ready for the Eagles.

"I know Union had trouble last week catching the ball and they had trouble on the line," Arnette said. "We'll see if that's the case again this week."

Last season, the Eagles had to do everything to hold off Union in the game which ended up determining the league champion.

"I know they're going to come ready to play next week for us," Arnette said. "They took us down to the wire last year. Justin Biermann proved to be the difference for us. We don't have him anymore. Hopefully some guys step up and fill those shoes."

Final Thoughts

Both coaches were complimentary of each other.

"Washington has some big strong boys and some kids who play hard," Arnette said. "They've got some talented kids at that, too. Their quarterback (Isaac Lippert), (Zach) Rennick and Bollmann are all great kids. They're going to win some games."

Schneider praised the Eagles.

"My hat's off to Sullivan and Coach Arnette," Schneider said. "They did exactly what they needed to do. It was a heck of a game for three quarters. I wish we would have put a better effort out there offensively, but we'll get better."

Warriors Hold Off Washington

Not even Mother Nature could stop Warrenton's celebration, although the Warriors had to move it indoors following Friday night's 14-6 win over the Washington Blue Jays at Rauch Field in Washington.

"We started playing Washington in 2006," Warrenton Head Coach Steve McDowell said. "We came close a couple of times with some real tight ballgames which always went Washington's way. It was nice to get that off our back tonight and beat a good Washington team tonight."

The skies opened up with a downpour soon after McDowell told his players to go and thank the student crowd which made the trip down Highway 47 for the contest.

"My hat's off to Coach McDowell," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said. "He did a heck of a job. He's got his kids playing at a very high level right now and we just didn't match it. It's frustrating. We had our opportunities tonight and we just didn't take advantage of them."

Warrenton improved to 3-0 with the victory while the Blue Jays fell to 1-2.

"We haven't been 3-0 to start a season since 2010," McDowell said. "We're just getting it rolling and getting everyone believing in the program."

Schneider said the Blue Jays need to do a better job offensively.

"The same as last week, our offense didn't do our defense any favors," Schneider said. "We couldn't stay on the field and sustain drives. We exposed our defense there at the end again."

That wasn't the only weather happening. Kickoff was delayed 31 minutes due to lightning in the area. While storms missed Washington, they were visible in the distance during the contest.

For the second week in a row, the Washington Blue Jays struggled to move the ball and managed one score for the game.

Washington's offense was hindered with three starters out or limited. Receiver Austin Finder is out with an ACL injury while starting running back Jared Rennick missed due to a shoulder injury. Receiver Seth Bollmann was extremely limited due to a groin injury.

"Rennick has a shoulder injury and Seth has a groin injury," Schneider said. "Seth was limited to straight-ahead running with no cuts. We had him for running vertical routes. He made a couple of good catches and drew a pass interference call."

Schneider knows the Blue Jays have to pick up the offense for this week's GAC Central opener at Ft. Zumwalt North. "Ft. Zumwalt North is one of the better teams in the state," Schneider said. "They're a senior-laden team with a lot of very good skill players. We're going to have our hands full. We're going to have to play a heck of a game Friday night."

Game Summary

There wasn't much scoring in the contest. Warrenton scored on its first possession with Justin McBroom running left from four yards out with 3:16 left in the first quarter. Dillen Mayfield kicked the extra point to make it 7-0.

"The biggest thing defensively is that it's the third week in a row that we've given up a touchdown on the opening drive," Schneider said. "We can't allow that to happen."

Washington came back with quarterback Isaac Lippert keeping the ball for a five-yard score with 5:53 left in the first half. The Blue Jays lined up in kick formation, but instinctively tried for a two-point run. It failed and it was 7-6 with Warrenton leading.

"We have an automatic check on number and alignment," Schneider said. "It was a check and it was my call. We took a chance on it. If it goes through and we win 8-7, it's a great call. It wasn't a great call. We were probably a little too aggressive. We'll get better."

That's how it stood, with the defenses coming up with big plays, until 3:42 remained in the game.

Warrenton quarterback Ryan Bradshaw found Alec Tonioli on the left side. Trying to stay inbounds, Tonioli broke a number of Washington arm tackle attempts and went 53 yards for the insurance touchdown. Mayfield's kick made it 14-6.

"That sealed the deal," McDowell said. "We told them that they had to make plays. That's what the game's about. It may be designed to make five or six yards. Sometimes you've got to turn it into more than that. That's what we did on that last touchdown. Hat's off to him for making a tremendous football play for a touchdown."

Schneider agreed.

"They did some really good things to get that second score," Schneider said.

Statistics

Warrenton outgained Washington, 290-184. Warrenton did most of its damage through the air, throwing for 211 yards while running for 79. Washington ran for 111 yards and threw for 73 yards.

Bradshaw completed 14 of 24 attempts for 211 yards, one touchdown and one interception.

Tonioli led the Warriors with seven catches for 104 yards. Hunter Russell caught four passes for 58 yards while Craig Vardiman had two catches for 45 yards and Zach Logan caught one pass for four yards.

Logan led the Warriors on the ground with 27 carries for 85 yards. Bradshaw kept it four times for 11 yards and McBroom had two carries for one yard. Brayden Chmiel and Vardiman also ran the ball.

The Blue Jays were led by Brendan Reed, who had 13 carries for 74 yards. Lippert ran 10 times for 28 yards and Matt McGilvray had three carries for 11 yards.

Lippert completed seven of 14 attempts for 73 yards and one interception.

Ben Straatmann caught four passes for 39 yards. Bollmann had two catches for 27 yards and Adam Kleekamp caught a pass for seven yards.

Defensively, Warrenton was led by George Wielms, who had 12 total tackles. Jacob Able was next at seven while Eric Schneider added six.

"The defense just gave up the one score tonight and each and every time we had to call on them to make the big play, they did," McDowell said. "They forced several turnovers tonight and were able to stop a lot of third and long situations. They kept us in the ballgame all night long."

Nick Thiel and Jacob Brinker each had 10 total tackles for the Blue Jays. Straatmann ended with nine and Christopher Jasper added eight.

Kleekamp added a fumble recovery and an interception.

The fumble recovery saved a potential touchdown as a Warrenton receiver was running into the end zone in the fourth quarter.

"It was a great example of playing through the play and not stopping until he crossed the goal line," Schneider said. "It was a great play. It gave us a breath and a chance, but we didn't capitalize on it."

Jay Jacquin had one sack for the Blue Jays. Trevor Reese and Logan had sacks for Warrenton.

Week 4 Previews

The Blue Jays face a serious challenge in the GAC Central opener Friday at Ft. Zumwalt North (3-0). Kickoff in O'Fallon is at 7 p.m.

The Panthers have rolled in their three wins so far, winning 27-17 over St. Charles West in the opening week, 31-19 at Ft. Zumwalt West in the second week and 56-0 over Troy last week.

"We're going to take the approach of putting in a great week of work and then seeing what happens Friday night," Schneider said. "You never know. We'll see if we can make something exciting happen."

The Panthers are comfortable in moving the ball on the ground or through the air. Deon Leach leads the team in rushing with 35 carries for 392 yards and three touchdowns. Brenden Pierce has 42 attempts for 348 yards and four scores. Camren Fullerton has run 13 times for 146 yards and one score.

Pierce, the quarterback, has completed 15 of 35 pass attempts for 267 yards and four touchdowns. Tre' Johnson has four catches for 85 yards and one score. Fullerton has caught five passes for 79 yards and two scores.

Dacey Brister is the leading tackler with 44. He also has one sack and three fumble recoveries.

Warrenton opens GAC North play at St. Charles. The Pirates opened the season with a 35-7 win over crosstown rival Duchesne and then won at Windsor, 30-12. St. Charles West beat the Pirates last Saturday, 33-3.

Ft. Zumwalt North Defeats Blue Jays

Zach Schneider knew the Ft. Zumwalt North Panthers were good heading into Friday night's game in O'Fallon. And Ft. Zumwalt North (4-0, 1-0) lived up to its billing, shutting out the Blue Jays (1-3, 0-1) in the GAC Central opener for both teams, 49-0.

"I feel Ft. Zumwalt North will be one of the better teams in Class 5, especially if they can get out of their district, which is tough," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said. "I think if they can get by Ft. Zumwalt East next week they have a great shot at the GAC Central. Of course, you can't disregard what Ft. Zumwalt South is doing and that is a heck of a rivalry."

Ft. Zumwalt South (4-0, 1-0) is Washington's next opponent with homecoming kickoff set for 7 p.m. Friday night at Rauch Field. More about that game is in another part of this story.

Schneider indicated changes, especially on the offensive side of the ball, are possible.

"Its hard to say what kind of changes will be made," Schneider said. "Right now, we are more concerned with our kids making progress on a weekly basis and try to put our kids in a position to be successful on Friday night."

Ft. Zumwalt North

The host squad led 14-0 after one quarter and 35-0 at the half, scoring on the final play before the intermission. The game had a running clock through the second half with Ft. Zumwalt North scoring once in each of the last two quarters.

"As Coach (Jeff) Duncan has told me many times, when you play sophomores on Friday nights the deck is stacked against you," Schneider said. "However, due to injuries and poor play, we are forced to give some of those kids some looks."

The Panthers dominated every category during the contest. The Panthers ran 38 times for 361 yards and completed two of four pass attempts for 55 yards.

Washington ran 25 times for 23 yards and completed six of 16 pass attempts for 36 yards.

Washington also hurt itself with three turnovers (two interceptions and one fumble).

"Turnovers have been brutal on us offensively," Schneider said. "We have to be much more careful with the ball. Our defense was forced to play in a lot of bad situations throughout the evening. With that being said, Ft. Zumwalt North is one heck of a team and when we don't play at the level we are capable of, we just help a better team be even better than they are."

Individual Stats

Washington had plenty of work on defense and Ben Straatmann led the way with seven solo tackles and five assists for 12 total tackles.

Brandon Brown was next with nine total tackles (five solos and four assists). Isaac Lippert had five solo stops.

Jacob Brinker (four solos and three assists) and Tommy Hemmer (three solos and four assists) had seven stops each. Nick Thiel was next at five (three solos, two assists).

Offensively, the Blue Jays didn't have many standouts.

Cole Wrinkle was the leading rusher with three carries for 16 yards.

Brendan Reed was next with six carries for eight yards. Jeremy Monehan ran seven times for three yards. Trey Walsh ran twice for two yards. Lippert has one yard on four carries. Straatmann ran once for one yard.

Matt Hoemann and Adam Kleekamp also carried the ball one time each.

Lippert completed four of five pass attempts for 14 yards and one interception. Hoemann completed one pass in four attempts for eight yards. Walsh was 1-3 for 14 yards and an interception.

Straatmann picked up the most yardage from scrimmage by any Blue Jay, catching four passes for 28 yards. Walsh had one catch for eight yards and Kleekamp caught a pass for no yardage.

Ft. Zumwalt North distributed the ball and five different backs had at least 40 rushing yards in the game.

Brenden Pierce, the quarterback, led the way with seven carries for 92 yards and a touchdown. Deon Lewis ran 14 times for 87 yards and one score.

Cade Brister had four carries for 75 yards and one touchdown.

Camren Fullerton had four rushes for 51 yards and two touchdowns. Tre' Johnson ran five times for 44 yards and one touchdowns.

Jake Cecil added two carries for 10 yards and Tavian Robinson had two rushes for two yards.

Pierce completed two of three pass attempts for 55 yards and a touchdown. Johnson caught one of those for a 47-yard touchdown and Fullerton caught the other pass for eight yards.

Defensively, Dacey Brister made 17 total stops (11 solos, six assists). Trenton Jaco and Marcus Jones intercepted passes, Blake Wilson recovered a fumble and Josh Hoener and Chase Smith recorded sacks.

Ft. Zumwalt South

The Blue Jays return home to face another GAC Central favorite, Ft. Zumwalt South, Friday night. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.

Washington still has some key injuries. Receiver-defensive back Seth Bollmann is questionable for this week while running back Jared Rennick likely is out.

"Seth is up in air for this week," Schneider said. "We think we will have him back, but with a groin injury on speed guys you never know and right now we would like to play it safe. Jared will be out this week with a shoulder injury, but we could have him back soon. It really depends how his shoulder reacts to the treatment he is going through."

The Bulldogs opened conference play last week with a 61-41 win over Holt.

In previous weeks, South defeated Troy, 42-27, Francis Howell Central, 35-14, and Francis Howell North, 28-21.

Pendilton Whaley leads Bulldogs in rushing with 480 yards on 55 carries. He has scored nine touchdowns.

Cameron Henderson has 435 rushing yards on 57 carries with seven touchdowns.

Drake Whaley is the top quarterback, going 12-19 for 269 yards, four touchdowns and an interception. The top receiver is Marshawn Blackmon, who has seven catches for 215 yards and three touchdowns.

Ft. Zumwalt South Defeats Blue Jays

On the second offensive play of the game the Ft. Zumwalt South Bulldogs gave the Washington Blue Jays a taste of what was to come.

Running back Pendilton Whaley took the handoff right through the Washington defense for a 67-yard touchdown run. The big play was the first of many for the Bulldogs en route to a dominant 56-7 win on homecoming at Washington. "Ft. Zumwalt South is playing tremendous football up front right now," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said. "They have large, mean men on the offensive line and defensive line. That was the difference on Friday night." The Bulldogs improved to 5-0, 2-0 in the GAC Central, on the season and dropped Washington to 1-4, 0-2.

Game Recap

Ft. Zumwalt South built up a 21-0 lead before the Blue Jays recorded a first down. The Bulldogs were up 14-0 just three minutes into game after Whaley's long run and Channon Ross recovered his blocked punt in the end zone with nine minutes left in the opening quarter.

On the next possession, Cameron Henderson picked up a 38-yard gain to put the Bulldogs in scoring position.

Quarterback Drake Whaley finished off the drive with a 1-yard run.

Three minutes after the score, with 4:39 left in the first quarter, a fake punt by the Jays resulted in Washington's first first down of game.

Zumwalt South added on to its lead early in the second quarter with its second 60-plus yard play of the game.

Pendilton Whaley struck again, this time from 69 yards out, for the score.

On Washington's ensuing possession the Jays saw starting quarterback Trey Walsh leave with an injury.

Washington turned things over to sophomore Matt Hoemann and initially struck gold. On Hoemann's first snap he dropped back to pass and, with good protection, had time to find Seth Bollman.

The pass initially looked like a short gain for the Blue Jays until Bollmann took off. After a series of cuts and broken tackles, Bollmann was in the end zone with a 66-yard score to cut the lead to 28-7 in favor of Zumwalt South.

The scoring play would be the last for the Blue Jays but the Bulldogs weren't done.

Cameron Henderson scored twice on runs of 45 and 10 yards and Pendilton Whaley returned an interception 33 yards for a touchdown in the span of three minutes late in the first half to put Zumwalt South up 49-7 at the break.

The second half featured far fewer fireworks. Thanks to the running clock mercy rule and both teams desire to run the ball for short gains, the final two quarters were over quickly.

The Blue Jays started the third with a lengthy sustained drive led by quarterback Issac Lippert. Washington was unable to score on the drive, however, and the Bulldogs got the ball back.

Midway through the third quarter Marquel Harris scored the final touchdown on an 18-yard run to put Zumwalt South up 56-7.

The fourth quarter was quiet and scoreless as both teams ran out the clock.

Despite the loss, Schneider said he came away feeling positive about how his younger players fared.

"I was impressed how our sophomores handled playing against a very good team," he said. "We had some tremendous individual performances, both Ben Straatmann and Trey Walsh did some great things on Friday. Seth Bollmann is getting better as proven by the receiving numbers he had on Friday. We just have to keep plugging away and getting better."

Statistics

The game was one on the ground for the Bulldogs. Zumwalt South only attempted one six passes, completing one for 14 yards.

Washington had three different quarterbacks throw passes. Cole Wrinkle was 2-4 for 35 yards. Hoemann was 1-2 for 66 yards, a touchdown and an interception. Walsh went 1-2 for 19 yards.

In total, the Blue Jays' quarterbacks were 4-10 for 120 yards. At least four different Jays lined up at the position.

"Right now we are looking for an individual to step up, make good decisions, and put out team in a position to be successful," Schneider said. "We have to continue to limit our turnovers. We must impress upon our kids how important it is to take care of the football. Good things happen when a team can have a successful kick at the end of each possession and we are not doing that right now."

Rushing the ball, the Jays were out gained 361-142. Zumwalt South averaged 13.4 yards per carry compared to just 3.6 for Washington.

The Jays rushing attack was led by Brenden Reed and Walsh. Reed had 12 carries for 47 yards. Walsh ran the ball 10 times for 39 yards.

Ben Straatmann had eight rushes for 25 yards.

Defensively the Jays were led by Straatmann's four tackles. Fifteen different Jays recorded at least one tackle with six getting at least two.

The Blue Jays failed to record a sack or any garner any turnovers.

Union Preview

The Blue Jays will hit the road in Week 6 and head to Union.

After an 0-2 start, Union enters Friday's game winners of three in a row. In Week 5 action the Wildcats beat St. Clair 55-35.

The Wildcats have had little trouble scoring this season. Through five games Union has put up 166 points, an average of 33.2 points per game.

Giving up points has also been a problem for the Wildcats. Union has allowed 178 points this year, 35.6 per game. Schneider said the key against Union is going to be playing strong defensively and limiting turnovers.

"We have to limit Union's big plays and take care of the ball on offense," he said.

Hulsey Leads Union Past Blue Jays

It was a perfect homecoming for the Union Wildcats.

Union (4-2, 3-0) renewed its rivalry with the Washington Blue Jays (1-5, 0-2) with a 54-14 victory at Stierberger Stadium Friday night.

"I like restarting rivalries, especially when I can restart them on top," Union Head Coach Erick Webster said. "That's a good deal. I know we've got them scheduled for next year. It's good to get another Franklin County rival going. It would be nice to get a Franklin County Bowl going. We'll have to see about that."

Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said the Blue Jays are struggling right now.

"We're just not playing very good right now," Schneider said. "It starts with me and goes down. Our execution is not there. I'm at a loss. I don't feel like we've done much positive over the last three weeks. We felt like we could come out and be more competitive tonight. We'll keep working on it."

The teams were longtime rivals before Washington left the Four Rivers Conference to play in the Gateway Athletic Conference. The game normally closed the season and frequently determined the team advancing to the playoffs. "It felt great to play them," Union senior quarterback Blake Hulsey said. "We haven't played them in a while. To come out like that was a pretty great feeling, especially on homecoming night."

Schneider feels Washington will get better.

"There will be better days for us ahead," Schneider said. "They've got a really good team this year. We're not playing very good. It's one of those things that anyone who has been a part of that rivalry in the past knows it has been back and forth. We'll have better days ahead. It's unfortunate it had to end like this today. They have a very good team and we just didn't play very good."

Union scored the game's first 33 points and nearly had a shutout going into the halftime intermission before the Blue Jays scored with three-tenths of a second left in the half on a two-yard pass play from Isaac Lippert to Colton Lewis. The Wildcats resume Four Rivers Conference action on the road Friday, visiting Owensville (3-3, 2-1) while Washington returns home to host Ft. Zumwalt East (3-3, 1-1) in GAC Central action. Both games kick off at 7 p.m. Previews are below.

Hulsey Dominates

While Union Hulsey had never faced the Blue Jays in a varsity contest, he played like an old pro.

Hulsey completed 38 of 50 attempts for 438 yards and six touchdowns. On the ground, he carried the ball 10 times for 31 yards.

"One thing we had talked about earlier in the season was efficiency," Webster said. "We threw 15 of 16 in the first quarter and something like 19-23 or 24 in the second quarter for almost 300 yards. We were worried. They had big defensive linemen and we struggled to run the ball against them. If we can throw the rock, we're OK doing that." Union's line did fine in pass blocking though.

Hulsey credited the offensive line with giving him plenty of time to throw the ball. He was sacked twice in the game, and both came after he continued to try and find the perfect pass.

"It starts with the line," Hulsey said. "If the line gives me time, which they always do, then it's easy throwing to guys if they can catch the ball. They've been doing really good lately."

Webster said Hulsey has worked hard to become a strong player.

"He's a pretty special quarterback," Webster said. "He does a lot of things very well, especially when it comes to the underneath quick stuff. He hit a lot of those routes tonight. He does a great job with pitch and catch. He can move the ball very efficiently."

Hulsey distributed the ball to six different receivers in the game and two of them share the six touchdowns.

Logan Bellamy caught both touchdowns in the first quarter of 21 and three yards. He had nine catches for 114 yards. Nick Eads caught the next four touchdown passes with distances of 24, 27 and 14 yards in the second quarter and two yards in the third quarter. He caught 12 passes for 165 yards.

"I can depend on all of the receivers," Hulsey said. "I'm happy with my receivers."

Jerod Mattingly had 10 catches for 116 yards, Blake Pickard caught three passes for 37 yards, Dustin Griffin caught one pass for 19 yards and Nick Maher had one catch for six yards.

"I'm just worried about high school football right now," Hulsey said. "Everything has been going great. I'm just looking to capitalize on that."

Hulsey indicated he hopes to continue playing football beyond high school and several colleges have been in contact about securing his services next season.

Union's Ground Game

When the Wildcats did go to the ground attack, Nick Maher got the call and he scored Union's final two touchdowns. The first one, which came during the third quarter, went for one yard. The second was a 26-yard run. Maher had four carries for 45 yards. Dalton Fennessey ran four times for five yards.

Peth's Interception

Union senior Casey Peth almost scored in the third quarter, but had to settle for a 52-yard interception return to the Washington one-yard line in the third quarter.

"I think he sits at home and fantasizes about picking off balls," Webster said. "We were watching video this week and he said he was going to pick one off. He's a converted defensive lineman who became a linebacker. And sure enough, he picked one off."

Peth had three solo tackles and six assists in the game.

Drew Reed led the team in solo tackles with five and added three assists. Maher had nine total tackles. Ryan Schumaker recorded three solo tackles and Jacob Fleming posted five total tackles.

Clay Cummings made another big play on the kickoff to start the second half, recovering a Washington fumble at the Union 33 after a long return by Brenden Reed.

"We botched the kickoff coverage," Webster said. "Somebody decided that wasn't going to stand and stripped it out. Clay jumped on that and that was outstanding. I was very pleased with the pursuit."

Maher also recovered a fumble.

Union was able to secure its lead more efficiently as well.

"Last week, we only needed to protect a 13-point lead," said Webster. "That's all we needed for the district. I could care less about a running clock. It doesn't do anything for us or help anyone out. It gets the refs home earlier. I would rather have the reps than the running clock. Tonight, we may have left our old guys in one series too long. I know when you get to third down and you've got two starters limping, that's not a good thing."

Webster said all of Union's injured players should be ready to go this week for the Owensville game.

Washington Highlights

Besides the score to close the first half, the Blue Jays also scored with 3:59 to play on a one-yard run by Ben Straatmann. Conlan Jarvis kicked both extra points on the night.

Despite the running clock in the second half, the Blue Jays were able to gain 174 yards in total offense during the game.

The Blue Jays threw for 99 yards and ran for 75.

Isaac Lippert completed most of the Washington passes, going 9-15 for 75 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Lippert took over in the second quarter.

Trey Walsh, the starter, was 2-2 for 13 yards. Cole Wrinkle played the final quarter and went 1-3 for 11 yards.

"It boils down to we've got to be better at the position," Schneider said. "Trey does some really good things for us.

Isaac does some very good things as well. His big thorn is interceptions and they had one they took back to the one-yard line. That came after we fumbled the opening kickoff of the second half on a great return. We're looking for people to build on and make positive plays. We couldn't block a soul for Trey."

Schneider indicated the starter for the Ft. Zumwalt East game will be the quarterback who has the best week of practice.

"The only thing he will be guaranteed is that first snap and we'll go from there," Schneider said.

Adam Kleekamp caught four passes for 29 yards. Connor Lewis had three catches for 30 yards and one touchdown.

Ben Straatmann had three catches for 20 yards and Austin Lewis caught two balls for 20 yards.

On the ground, Straatmann was the leading rusher with three carries for 25 yards.

Brenden Reed ran nine times for 20 yards while Lippert picked up 20 yards on seven carries. Walsh ran three times for 10 yards.

The Blue Jays played again without Jared Rennick, the starting running back at the start of the season. He's been out since Week 3, but is expected back in the lineup for the home game against Ft. Zumwalt East.

"I want my sophomores to play like seniors," Schneider said. "But we've got to be patient and keep plugging away."

Defensively, Washington had plenty of chances to work against Union's offense.

Christopher Jasper was the leader in solo stops with eight.

Kleekamp posted seven solo tackles and three assists to lead all Blue Jays with 10 total tackles.

Seth Bollmann had six solo tackles. Jacob Brinker recorded five tackles and one assist while Jay Jacquin had five solo stops.

Brinker and Jacquin each had one sack.

"We keep getting younger and younger each week and that's not a good thing," Schneider said. "You could see our youth with turnovers, having the ball pop out and giving up big plays on third and fourth downs. They just haven't been in those situations. We'll play again next week and see if we can get any better."

Blue Jays Find Offense, Zumwalt East Wins Game

Not even Washington's newfound offense could thwart the Ft. Zumwalt East juggernaut Friday night.

The visiting Lions (4-3, 2-1) handed the Blue Jays (1-6, 0-3) a setback at Rauch Field Friday night 62-35.

"We had our opportunities tonight," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said. "That's a good team. Shane Barrett is a heck of a quarterback and they've got some really good receivers. If you give them that many chances, they're going to find their spots and take advantage. I felt we have moved beyond where we have been for the past three weeks and we've got something to build on. It feels a lot better than where we've been. We've got games ahead where we can be successful and we're going to work on that."

Washington's 35 points was its best offensive output of the season and equalled the scoring for the five previous games combined.

"We did a lot of good things out here," Schneider said. "East gave us some things we thought we could exploit and our kids executed. We did some things very positive tonight and we did some things that were our old selves again." However, that wasn't enough to overcome Barrett and the Lions. Barrett completed 15 of 20 passes for 348 yards, five touchdowns and an interception. On the ground, he ran 12 times for 126 yards and two touchdowns.

Opening Score

The Blue Jays scored first in the game on a nine-yard pass from Trey Walsh to Seth Bollmann. Conlan Jarvis kicked the extra point and the Blue Jays led 7-0 with 5:17 to play in the first quarter.

Walsh completed three of five passes for 23 yards and a touchdown. On the ground, he ran 10 times for 58 yards.

"Trey had a tremendous week of practice," Schneider said. "The big thing right now is that he's figuring it out. He's a sophomore and things came together for him this week. We've got a lot of confidence that we could do something like that tonight. We didn't make a mistake on that drive. The following drives between our first and second drives, we had a penalty, a dropped pass or a turnover. I thought we executed well on offense except for the little mistakes in the first half."

Bollmann ended the game with six catches for 90 yards and three touchdowns.

The score came after the Blue Jays made a defensive stop on the opening drive and worked the ball downfield with confidence.

Jared Rennick returned to the lineup for the first time since the Sullivan game in Week 2 and made an immediate impact.

"I think everyone saw what a difference he made with his physical level of play and strength," Schneider said. "He broke a lot of tackles tonight. I'm extremely proud of the way he played, and the way our offensive line played tonight. They did some good things. It makes a world of difference to have Jared back there."

Rennick lugged the ball 24 times for 157 yards, an average of 6.5 yards per carry. He also caught one pass for two yards.

Lions Roar Back

Washington's lead lasted 19 seconds, long enough for a long kickoff return and a 33-yard pass from Barrett to Devon Dillon.

After a fumble, the Lions struck again 16 seconds later on a 26-yard pass from Barrett to Matt Etherton.

It took 35 seconds for the Lions to score twice and they never looked back.

"It's a different game at the half if we take away our two big turnovers," Schneider said. "That led to 14 points for them. We had really poor kickoff coverage that led to their first touchdown as well."

Washington Rebounds

Trailing 35-7, the Blue Jays needed something big late in the half.

"Our kids had every opportunity to unsnap it and be done for the night," Schneider said. "I'm very proud of our kids for fighting back. They wanted to get better. I feel we made great improvements from last week."

With 3:18 to play in the half, Isaac Lippert found Bollmann for a 12-yard touchdown pass. Jarvis booted the extra point and it was 35-14.

"Isaac did a great job in the first half when we were going back and forth," Schneider said.

Lippert completed 16 of 29 pass attempts for 221 yards, three touchdowns and an interception. He ran eight times for 13 yards.

The Blue Jays were able to score again. Lippert connected with Bollmann for a five-yard pass with three seconds left in the half. Jarvis made the extra-point kick and it was 35-21 at the half.

The last score marked the second week in a row that the Blue Jays had scored with three or fewer seconds to play in the half.

East Seals Game

"We had an opportunity to cut it to one score early in the second half," Schneider said. "We had a holding penalty about the 40-yard line when we were marching. We didn't recover from it and that hurt. If we put up a score there, who knows what happens. They were able to stop us and get back on the board really quickly."

The Lions took care of offensive business in the third quarter, scoring the only two touchdowns.

"They found some weaknesses in our defense when they went to five-receiver sets and empty backfields," Schneider said. "We've got to stop the run first. They attacked us really well. My hat's off to Coach (Scott) Eacret. They did really well."

Overall, Schneider feels there's room for improvement defensively.

"We've just got to tackle better," Schneider said. "We do that and we'll be all right."

Another touchdown to start the fourth quarter gave the Lions a 55-21 advantage. Washington wasn't done though.

Lippert, still in playing for Walsh, who came out with a leg injury, completed a 50-yard scoring pass to Ben Straatmann down the right sideline. Jarvis kicked the extra point to cut it to 55-28 with 8:58 to play.

After another Ft. Zumwalt East score, the Blue Jays closed out scoring on a one-yard run by Straatmann with 3:04 to play. Jarvis kicked the extra point, his fifth of the night.

Straatmann ran once for the touchdown. He caught one pass for 50 yards.

Other Washington receivers were Adam Kleekamp with six catches for 50 yards and Austin Lewis with five catches for 52 yards. Kleekamp ran the ball seven times for 30 yards.

While the offense stepped up, there's still plenty of work on defense. The Blue Jays gave up 531 yards in total offense with most of that coming through the air.

Etherton caught eight passes for 173 yards and Morris had five catches for 145 yards.

Washington also lost two fumbles and an interception. Schneider said the Blue Jays also committed penalties. Those are mistakes which can be corrected.

Bollmann, Kleekamp, Straatmann and Jeremy Monehan had four solo tackles each. Tommy Hemmer and Connor Mueller each had three total stops.

Holt Preview

The Blue Jays will try to pick up a GAC Central win Friday at Holt. Kickoff in Wentzville is set for 7 p.m.

"I'm just worried about Monday," Schneider said after Friday's game. "If we can get through the practices, I like our chances next week, especially if we can get a good week of practice under their belts. We'll see."

Holt is winless this season and is 0-3 in league action. The two teams have three common opponents. Holt lost 61-41 to Ft. Zumwalt South, 42-12 to Ft. Zumwalt East and 32-20 to Ft. Zumwalt North.

Washington lost 49-0 to Ft. Zumwalt North, 56-7 to Ft. Zumwalt South and 62-35 to Ft. Zumwalt East.

Washington will see one of the St. Louis area's top quarterbacks in Emilio Monsivais, who has completed 131 of 246 passes for 1,836 yards, 16 touchdowns and nine interceptions.

Six different receivers have at least 11 catches with Jake Coons (18-373, four touchdowns) and Nick Tompkins (21-304, four touchdowns) leading the way.

On the ground, Monsivais, Brendan Lenac (38-167, three touchdowns) and Jared Wolfrum (36-167, two touchdowns) leading the way.

Defensively, Cee Monsivais is the top tackler with 53 stops, three sacks and a fumble recovery.

Jesus Rocha has intercepted two passes and Lenac has three fumble recoveries.

Holt Slips Past Blue Jays, 21-14

Somewhere in the muck and mire of Soby Field, the Holt Indians found just enough clean grass and grip on the ball to earn their first football win of the season.

Unfortunately for the Washington Blue Jays, that victory came at their expense Friday night in Wentzville, 21-14.

Holt (1-7, 1-3) stopped Washington on fourth down and then drove 56 yards in just over a minute to get the winning score against the Blue Jays (1-7, 0-4) on an 11-yard pass from Emilio Montsevais to Devin Pettit with 19 seconds to play.

"Hat's off to their quarterback," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said. "He hit the passes. We didn't get the stop. It was a tough one to swallow, but our kids played their tails off tonight. They played with a lot of heart. They just came up short. They've made a lot of progress over the past couple of weeks and I hope we can continue it this week."

Washington was able to twice tie the game and seemed to be moving toward the game-winning score in the closing minutes.

Stopped Short

Holt had no answer for Jared Rennick as he hauled the ball and Holt tacklers through the bog in the middle of the field.

However, the Blue Jays ended up facing fourth and one from the Holt 44 with just under two minutes to play. Going for the first down, the Blue Jays were stopped short of the marker, giving Holt a final chance.

"I'm going to take a lot of the blame," Schneider said. "We probably should have punted the ball and put them back to make them drive the whole length of the field. We needed a yard and we needed a stop. We didn't get either one of them. We were trying to win the game and not go to overtime. That's why we went for it on fourth and one."

The result didn't wash away the mud, or the hurt, for the Blue Jays.

"We stopped ourselves more than anything on offense," Schneider said. "We would get penalties or just stop on offense. There were a lot of good things to build on, but I hate it for the kids. This was one that was within our reach to pull. Everyone knows when you're struggling like we are, you need something like this to go your way. This one didn't go our way."

And the Indians took advantage of every Washington mistake. Washington had chances to end the drive early and potentially send the game to overtime. Seth Bollmann nearly intercepted Montsevais on the sideline, but the ball slipped through his grasp.

The Indians took advantage of a pass interference call to set up the 11-yard touchdown to Pettit, who by that time was covered from helmet to cleats with mud.

Washington Superlatives

Ben Straatmann scored both of the Washington touchdowns in the game, one coming on a 67-yard interception return and the other coming on a one-yard run from the Wildcat formation.

The sophomore had a big game for Washington, running six times for 31 yards and a touchdown, catching a pass for 36 yards, returning two kicks for 36 yards, posting the interception and making seven total tackles (four solos, three assists).

In the mud, the Blue Jays turned to junior Jared Rennick, who was able to find traction in the mire for 120 rushing yards on 24 carries. Holt had no answer for him and frequently had to send the bulk of the defense to try and drag him down.

"Jared had another tremendous game," Schneider said. "I think everyone can see what a difference he makes when he's carrying the ball like he has the past two weeks. It makes a world of difference for our offense."

Rennick also caught one pass for three yards.

The Blue Jays employed four quarterbacks on the night, although only two attempted passes.

"I don't like it," Schneider said. "I would like to use one guy back there. We're not executing really good at calling the shots right now. Tonight, we used four guys and they did fairly well to their strengths. Each made mistakes, but all showed glimpses of what they could do. We'll continue to do that because it gives us our best shot to do something positive and playing good offensive football."

Sophomore Trey Walsh started and completed all four of his pass attempts for 81 yards. He also ran seven times for 12 yards.

Senior Isaac Lippert came in and completed one of seven attempts for 36 yards and an interception (the receiver slipped in the mud during the route) and also ran three times for four yards.

Straatmann scored Washington's lone touchdown of the night from a Wildcat formation. Sophomore Adam Kleekamp also took snaps, running four times for 10 yards in the game.

"We put him in there yesterday (Thursday) just to do some stuff in the slop and he did an excellent job," Schneider said. "Adam has been a quarterback and he did some good things as well."

Senior Seth Bollmann was Washington's top receiver, catching three passes for 78 yards.

Defensively, seniors Jacob Brinker and Brandon Brown recorded two sacks apiece.

Brown had a huge game defensively with 10 solo tackles and two assists.

Junior Jeremy Monehan recorded five solo tackles and one assist. Brinker added three solos and two assists.

Bollmann had three solo stops.

Sophomore Connor Muller had two tackles and one assist. Sophomore Zach Jasper had two solo tackles.

Howell North

Washington plays at home Friday night, hosting Francis Howell North from the GAC South. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. Schneider knows the Blue Jays have a huge challenge in the game.

"They're big, physical and like to run the ball," Schneider said. "It's our Kryptonite. We've got to get tough and stop the run."

Francis Howell North enters the game with a 2-6 overall record, 2-3 in the GAC South.

The Knights average 21 points per game offensively while allowing nearly 35 points per game.

Wins have come over Francis Howell Central (51-34), and Troy (28-0).

Losses have been against Vianney, Ft. Zumwalt East, Ft. Zumwalt South, Francis Howell, Timberland and Ft. Zumwalt West.

Running back Elijah Keely is the player to watch on offense. He has 664 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns on 105 carries.

DJ Curtis has picked up 494 rushing yards and five scores on 64 carries.

Brendan Lieser has completed 56 of 110 attempts for 682 yards, four touchdowns and two interceptions. Donnell Hawkins (24-368) is his top receiver with AJ Schulze and Jake Viehman also at over 100 receiving yards for the season.

Defensively, Rhe'Neze Galtney is the player to watch with 89 total tackles, two sacks and one fumble recovery.

Looking to end the home schedule the way they started it, the Washington football Blue Jays led for most of Friday night's contest.

But the Francis Howell North Knights took the lead on a two-yard run by DJ Curtis 1:16 to play in the third quarter and held on to defeat the Blue Jays at Scanlan Stadium, 24-20.

"First and foremost, I'm very proud of the kids," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said. "They played their tails off. This is three weeks in a row that we've seen a different team on the field. We're putting good stuff together and we're getting better as a team. It doesn't show on the record, but we're progressing. We're making steps in the right direction."

Washington (1-8) had chances down the stretch but couldn't convert to overcome the Knights (3-6).

"We put ourselves into position to win the game in the last quarter," Schneider said. "For the way we've played this year, that's a big plus. We're putting ourselves into better positions than in the previous weeks. I'm pleased with the work they've put in to become a better team."

With the loss, the Blue Jays were seeded sixth for the Class 5 District 4 Tournament and will face third-seeded Battle (5-4) Friday at 7 p.m. The school is located at 7575 East St. Charles Road in Columbia.

Washington has lost eight games in a row after winning the home opener against St. Clair, 26-21.

Hot Start

The Blue Jays opened the game with the only two touchdowns of the first quarter.

"They did a tremendous job," Schneider said. "I felt we moved the ball very well. I thought we put ourselves into good situations. Having the two-touchdown lead was huge for us. We did some very good things, but not enough to pull it out in the end."

Washington built up a 20-7 lead before Howell North cut it to 20-17 at the intermission. Both teams struggled to move the ball in the second half with only Howell North scoring on the Curtis run.

Washington Positives

Junior Jared Rennick continued to lead Washington on the ground, picking up 126 yards on 19 carries. Two of his rushes went for touchdowns (21 and 15 yards).

Also among backs, sophomore Ben Straatmann ran twice for 16 yards while sophomore Adam Kleekamp carried the ball once for three yards and sophomore Brenden Reed ran once for two yards.

Only two Washington players caught passes. Straatmann had two catches for 89 yards and a touchdown (66 yards). Senior Seth Bollmann pulled in six catches for 67 yards.

Straatmann was the leading tackler with nine stops. Senior Jacob Brinker was next with seven total tackles. Bollmann and fellow seniors Jay Jacquin and Brandon Brown each had six tackles.

"I thought our defense played really well," Schneider said.

Bollmann averaged 20 yards per kick return.

Quarterbacks Hurt

Unlike the Week 8, Washington's use of three quarterbacks wasn't a result of personnel packages. This time, Schneider was forced to change signal callers due to injury.

Senior Isaac Lippert picked up a huge first down late in the second quarter, but was tackled out of bounds and left the game with a right knee injury.

Before going out, Lippert completed three of four pass attempts for 103 yards and one touchdown. He carried the ball once for 14 yards.

"Isaac played tremendous," Schneider said.

Sophomore Trey Walsh lasted into the third quarter before he also was injured.

Walsh was 1-2 for 23 yards through the air and had four carries for 27 yards on the ground.

Sophomore Matt Hoemann closed out the game taking snaps and engineered the Jays' last scoring chance which ended at the Howell North 18 with under a minute to play.

Hoemann completed four of 12 pass attempts for 30 yards and an interception. He carried the ball once for 30 yards.

"The plan was for Isaac and Trey to go back and forth," Schneider said. "Isaac is more of a classic pocket passer and Trey is our running threat. Isaac got banged up and Trey got banged up so Matt came in and did a tremendous job. I'm very proud of him. It was not an easy situation for him to be in. He got a chance tonight and did an awesome job. Had he connected on that last one, it would have been even better. I'm very proud of how he stepped into a tough situation and did good things."

Battle Preview

The Spartans will be playing their first-ever postseason game Friday night after joining the MSHSAA district grid this season. The newest Columbia school closed the regular season with a 28-14 victory over Hannibal on the road last Friday.

"I feel good because right now we're putting good weeks together," Schneider said. "We're getting better. It hasn't shown in the win column, but we're a better team than we were three weeks ago. Hopefully we can continue that trend and be an even better team next week."

The Spartans defeated Holt, 56-49, in Week 2, the only common opponent between the two schools.

Other wins were against Excelsior Springs (36-0), Hickman (14-7) and Lee's Summit North (37-7).

Losses have come against Jackson (62-34), Rock Bridge (25-11), Helias (29-14) and Jefferson City (38-20).

The Spartans have shown the ability to score against big schools and will look to put that experience to work for their advantage Friday night.

The winner will travel to Waynesville on Halloween. The loser concludes its season.

"The good thing that in this district, there really isn't a standout team right now," Schneider said. "If we can get to the point where we're playing pretty decent ball, who knows? With a couple of breaks here or there, maybe we can make a little run and end the season on a high note."

Battle Knocks Out Blue Jays Football

Battle's first-ever MSHSAA playoff victory proved to be Washington's final contest of the 2014 season Friday in Columbia.

The host Spartans (6-4) knocked out the Blue Jays (1-9), 56-8.

"As a coach, I hate that our seniors had such a rough year," Washington Head Coach Zach Schneider said. "I hope they take some positives out of the year. I enjoyed having them around and will miss them very much. As I told them on Friday, if this is the toughest thing they have to deal with in life, then they will have a great life."

The Spartans, who were not a part of the playoff system last season, started by recovering a fumble on the opening kickoff to set up the first score on the next play. Battle never looked back.

Washington lost the ball again on its first offensive play after that touchdown and Battle was on the move again.

"Due to turnovers on our first two possessions, we were unable to give them the game we felt we were capable of giving them," Schneider said.

The Spartans led 28-0 after one quarter and continued to add to the lead.

Washington ran for 147 yards in the game and passed for 59.

"Overall, we were beaten up front, both offensively and defensively," Schneider said. "We basically ran up against a very good, well-coached team."

Washington did have some positives in the game.

Despite being the focus of the Battle defense, running back Jared Rennick ran 16 times for 86 yards.

Matt Hoemann hit Seth Bollmann for Washington's lone touchdown in the game.

"Seth Bollmann was able to get behind the defense on the receiving end of a Matt Hoemann pass for our touchdown," Schneider said. "Matt then was able to convert the two-point conversion when Battle struggled to align correctly."

Hoemann completed four of nine attempts for 46 yards and one touchdown. Trey Walsh, another sophomore, completed two of five attempts for 13 yards and an interception.

Bollmann caught two passes for 26 yards while Adam Kleekamp had two grabs for six yards.

Connor Lewis had one catch for 17 yards and Austin Lewis caught a pass for 10 yards.

Hoemann ran six times for 27 yards and a two-point conversion.

Kleekamp had three rushes for 17 yards, Walsh ran twice for seven yards, Jeremy Monehan had one carry for seven yards and Bollmann ran once for three yards.

Bollmann led the defense with seven solo tackles and one assist. Kleekamp was next with six tackles. Jacob Brinker posted five solo tackles and an assist. Brandon Brown had four solos and one assist.

"We had some injuries that did not help us on Friday" Schneider said. "Isaac Lippert and Ben Straatmann were out while Jay Jacquin was very limited."
